ABOUT THE FOOD PANTRY

Falls Food Pantry is proud to serve residents from Lannon, Colgate, Hubertus, Richfield, Butler, Brookfield, Germantown and Menomonee Falls. The pantry has a refrigerator and freezer to allow them to stock milk, cheese and meat for their clients.

The food pantry asks those picking up food to pre-register and there are requirements but no one will be turned away. ID is required for all household members and there is a self-reported income maximum but once again, no one is turned away.

The pantry has regular hours on Tuesday and Thursday for pick up: 12 PM - 2 PM & 5 PM - 7 PM.

Donations can be left in the lobby 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

DELIBERATE CONTINUING EDUCATION

The term education brings to mind for many people a picture that might be described as passive learning. The instructor simply delivers the content and the student, to whatever extent possible, absorbs the content. This passive learning is associated with compulsory education as children and often causes people to have a distaste for education well into adulthood. It comes as no surprise then that education in the fire service often takes a backseat to training, specifically hands-on training. Nonetheless, education and training are equally important.

The technical college system offers excellent educational opportunities and yet many of us took classes to achieve the goal of certification. Generally speaking, many in the fire service limit their education to that which is required or necessary. Continuing education and lifelong learning require that we change how we view education. Fire and EMS education is not a race that ends with a certification or license but rather a career-long marathon that starts with initial certifications and only ends with retirement. This type of education is what keeps a career from going stagnant.

Continuing education could easily be named elective education—you as the student get to decide what to learn and how to receive that education. Many excellent opportunities exist within the fire service, but challenge yourself by looking for opportunities outside of the fire service as well. Make your education interesting and relevant, but most of all be deliberate. Schedule time to read a new book or attend a class. Choose topics and areas that challenge you and your thinking. Look for opportunities to perfect your craft. Continue your education.

CREAMY SWEET POTATO & RED LENTIL CURRY

This only takes 30 minutes to cook and is easy to prepare. From the Firehouse to your house, enjoy!

Ingredients

- | | |
|-------------------------------------|--------------------------------|
| 2 tbsp. olive oil | 3/4 C red lentils |
| 1/2 white onion | 1 (14.5 oz) can coconut milk |
| 1 tbsp. grated ginger | 1 1/2 C vegetable broth |
| 1 tbsp. grated garlic | Salt & pepper to taste |
| 1 tsp curry powder | Cilantro for garnish |
| 2 tbsp. tomato paste | Choice of rice, quinoa, or |
| 2 tbsp. red curry paste | cauliflower rice to serve with |
| 4 C cubed sweet potato (2 med size) | |

Directions

- Heat the oil in a large skillet. Add the onions and cook for 2 minutes while stirring. Add the ginger, garlic, and curry powder and cook for another minute.
- Once mixture is starting to be fragrant, add the tomato and red curry pastes. Stir everything together until combined.
- Stir in sweet potato and lentils and cook for another 30 seconds before adding the coconut milk. Bring this mixture to a boil then cover and simmer for 15 minutes.
- Remove lid and stir in vegetable broth, then season with salt and pepper. Cover again and cook for another 15 min.
- Serve warm with rice, quinoa, or cauliflower rice.

HAPPENINGS OF INTEREST

OCTOBER 2020

10/2/20—Dispatched for structure fire on Weather Edge Circle. While en route, dispatch updated units that fire was in oven and residents were not evacuating. 2765 arrived on scene of a single family residence with nothing showing. Homeowner stated he was pre-heating the oven and when he opened it he saw flames. He quickly closed it. There was a slight haze of smoke in the house. After investigation, it appeared that grease had been collecting in the bottom broiler for some time. Owner was advised to let it cool off and clean up the grease.

10/7/20—Received a call reporting fire on the walls at a home on Lilly Road. Upon arrival, saw no smoke from 3 sides of the building. Light smoke or extinguisher product above the roof line began to appear from back of building. Homeowner walked out with a spent large dry chemical extinguisher. Electricians were on scene completing what was reported as non-related work in the garage. The electricians along with the homeowner reported fire in the Charlie side wall. I combined 2762 and 2764 crews who pulled a crosslay for potential fire extinguishment. There was quick knock down with possible extension within the walls. Crews were instructed to check both the attic and crawlspace for fire spread; then overhauled the area to ensure the fire was out and no further fire spread. Charring to the wood framing, insulation and wiring within the wall were noted. Crews did their best to salvage while they overhauled.

10/11/20—Dispatched for a fire alarm going off on Menomonee Avenue. 2761 arrived on scene and had audible and visual alarms going off with nothing showing on the exterior of the building. Upon entry of the building there was the odor of smoke. Upon reaching the second floor a haze could be seen in the hallway. Upon entering the listed apartment number, the apartment was filled with smoke. On the stove there was a burnt wood cutting board. No active fire was noted in the residence. 2761 called for assistance with ventilation and crews from 2764 and Germantown truck brought PPV fans to assist with the ventilation. 2763 crew made access to the panel and assisted in resetting the alarm system. 2761 was then cleared by command and scene turned over to the property manager.

10/15/20—Dispatched for a cat in a tree on Ann Court. A maintenance manager was on a ladder getting the cat out of the tree. Worker began descending the ladder with the cat who began scratching him. Worker lost grip of the cat and it ran away when it hit the ground. Cat was noted to be in purrfect condition.

10/16/20—Dispatched for fire alarm, mutual aid Germantown, on Grant Drive. En route upgraded to working still at waste management facility, trash fire. Upon arrival interfaced with operations and were instructed to place the engine facing into the warehouse and use deluge gun to put water on fire. Deck gun was used for approximately one hour. Other crew member joined up with Germantown crew and made entry to facility with handline. After approximately 40 minutes crew withdrew and went to recovery. Fire was called under control in approximately one hour.

10/28/20—Dispatched for a vehicle fire at intersection of Silver Spring Drive and Marcy Road. 2765 arrived on scene and observed a utility pick up truck with a lift bucket and a trailer that was on the side of the road with moderate white smoke filling the scene. Several rolls of landscaping hay were observed, spread out on the paved sidewalk next to the truck. All hay rolls were burning. Landscaping hay had been pulled from the back of the truck. 2765 initially used the water can to ensure there was nothing burning in the back of the truck because there was light smoke coming from the hand tools that were still in the truck. 2762 arrived on scene and pulled the garbage line to extinguish the fire on the ground. Hand tools were used to spread out the hay rolls. Back of the truck was saturated and all fire and hot spots were completely extinguished. After talking to law enforcement, he had learned that one of the four occupants of the vehicle had possibly thrown a cigarette butt out the window that landed in the back, igniting the landscaping hay rolls.

THANKSGIVING FIRE SAFETY TIPS

- Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stove top so you can keep an eye on the food.
- Stay in the home when cooking your turkey, and check on it frequently.
- Keep children away from the stove. The stove will be hot and kids should stay three feet away.
- Make sure kids stay away from hot food and liquids. The steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns.
- Keep knives out of the reach of children.
- Be sure electric cords from an electric knife, coffee maker, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.
- Keep matches and utility lighters out of the reach of children — up high in a locked cabinet.
- Never leave children alone in room with a lit candle.
- Keep the floor clear so you don’t trip over kids, toys, pocketbooks or bags.
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.
