Our Year-Round Commitment to Service

Winter in Wisconsin inevitably brings brisk winds, cold temperatures, ice, and snow. Fortunately, the Village of Menomonee Falls has lots of experience with these weather conditions, and we are dedicated to providing a high level of municipal services during the coldest months of the year.

Just as residents prepare for winter with shovels, salt, and snow blowers, the Village annually outfits heavy equipment for winter operations and stocks the necessary amount of road salt, brine, and cold patch asphalt for pothole and crack filling. Each year, 30+ Public Works and Utilities operators clear snow and apply road treatments including an estimated 6,500 tons of salt to keep nearly 250 miles of local streets safe. Our commitment to Menomonee Falls residents and businesses starts with safe roads, but is much more comprehensive. Village staff provide wide-ranging services including maintenance of essential utilities, development reviews, building permit approvals, municipal court proceedings, park shelter reservations, voter information, and more. The Village's first responders are steadfast in their commitment to preserving public safety and to protect property whether the temperature is comfortable or below zero.

As always, this edition of *The Current* newsletter will provide seasonal information about Village services, give updates on development projects, and include stories and safety reminders from the Police Department and Fire Department. It features a HUGE play structure, an accessible merry-go-round and swing, a net climber, and a play hill. The splash pad is scheduled to open in May of 2023.

Winter Operations - Reminders for the Snowy Season

When does Public Works come out to plow?

We have over 30 Public Works and Utilities operators that work long hours throughout the winter to ensure that our streets are plowed and treated as efficiently as possible.

Snow and ice operations begin when any of the following conditions are met:

- Snow accumulation of 2" and more snow is expected
- Drifting snow is causing hazardous travel conditions
- Icy conditions are adversely affecting travel
- Time of snowfall is affecting peak travel times

What is the goal of snow and ice operations?

The immediate objective of snow and ice control operations is to maintain reasonably safe driving conditions during and following storm events. This does not, however, mean that bare pavement should be expected by motorists, nor does this mean that all streets will be free of snow and ice. Motorists and pedestrians are expected to take necessary precautions and to observe safe winter driving habits. Keep in mind that our snow and ice operations focus on the heavily-traveled roadways in Menomonee Falls, such as Main Street, Appleton Avenue, and Menomonee Avenue. All subdivisions will be plowed, but will only be salted on hills, curves, and intersections due to lower speed limits and less travel on these streets.

Will winter weather affect waste and recycling collection?

Please be aware that freezing temperatures may delay waste and recycling pickup services from Waste Management. Severe temperatures can cause equipment issues which can lead to delays. Please note that waste and recycling receptacles should be placed at least 3 feet away from each other and other objects. During the winter, please use your driveway or clear an area along the side of your driveway to place your carts.

Do I have to clear the sidewalk in front of my house?

It is the owner's responsibility to clear the concrete sidewalk in front of the property and treat with salt or sand if ice has formed. The Village clears sidewalks in front of Village property, as well as some parts of the downtown area. Asphalt trails are not considered sidewalks, so snow clearance is not required.

What else do I need to know about Winter Operations?

- Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street
- Do not pull up behind snow plows when they are equipped and engaged for snow removal.
- Snow plows may cause damage to turf adjacent to streets and sidewalks. Turf that has been damaged and reported will be repaired in the spring. The Village will not be responsible for damage as a result of the use of sand or de-icing chemicals or for damage to landscaping, sprinkler systems, or any other private items located in the public right-of-way.
- The Village encourages residents to clear the snow from any fire hydrants near your house.
- Residents are asked to check the condition of their mailbox and post – in most cases, a strong post and secure mailbox will withstand the impact of snow coming off of the snowplow.

2023 Dog Licenses

2022 dog licenses expire December 31, 2022. To license your dog, submit a completed [application for dog license](#) and a \$10 fee per dog (\$15 for unneutered/unspayed dogs) to the Clerk Services Department. After March 31, fees increase to \$15 for neutered/spayed dogs and \$20 for unneutered/ unspayed dogs.

Christmas Tree Disposal

The deadline for all natural Christmas trees to be set out by the road is the second Sunday in January. Trees will automatically be picked up as time permits – no appointments are necessary. Discarded natural Christmas trees must be clean of all decorations, lights, stands, tinsel, garland, wire, plastic bags, etc. Discarded Christmas wreaths must be disposed of in the garbage along with regular trash.

Public Projects

Capital projects which improved public spaces, streets, and infrastructure in 2022 included Village Park Phase II, replacement of the Lilly Road Bridge, reconstruction of Jacobson Drive and Chippewa Drive, construction of a water booster station reservoir near Town Line Road, and several utility projects.



The Lilly Road Bridge replacement project was completed in Fall 2022

Village Park Phase II

This project included a 12,000+ square foot inclusive play area, splash pad, pickleball/tennis courts, picnic shelter, trails, and an interior parking area. The project was funded with the support of a \$1 million+ fundraising campaign led by the Optimist Club of Menomonee Falls. The play area opened to the public in November, and the splash pad will operate starting in May of 2023.



Overview of 2022 Infrastructure Projects

- Lilly Road Bridge reconstruction
- 1.3 miles of new streets in five residential subdivisions
- 0.4 miles of reconstructed streets and 2.8 miles of asphalt repaving
- 2.2 miles of water main and 0.9 miles of sanitary sewer
- 0.4 miles of new asphalt trails at Village Park and near new residential subdivisions

The Village Park Phase II project supports a vision for the park to be a gathering place and community destination for residents and visitors of all ages.



Private Sector Projects

Both the residential and commercial development sectors remained strong in Menomonee Falls in 2022 with dozens of major projects adding homes, value, and new jobs to the Village.

2022 Year in Review



Menomonee Falls remained among the regional leaders for home construction in 2022. At the end of the third quarter, the Village had issued permits for 12 percent of the new housing units constructed in the Milwaukee Metropolitan Area.

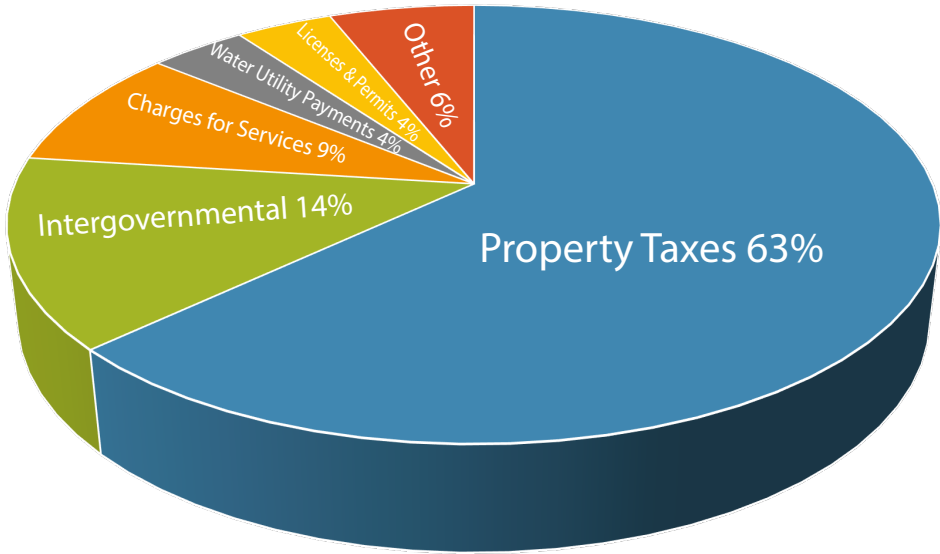

Summary

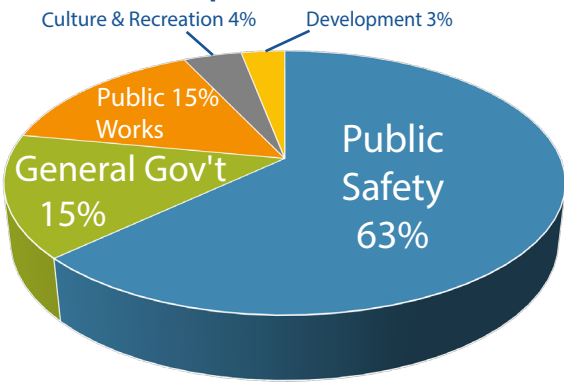
The 2023 General Operating Budget was adopted on November 21st, 2022 with total revenues and expenditures of \$30,961,800, which is a 3.6% increase from 2022. The budget reflects the Village's mission to provide the highest quality municipal services consistent with the changing needs and desires of the community and a realistic assessment of resources

available. The primary source of financing for the General Operating Budget (63%) comes from property taxes. Village spending for operations includes general government, police, fire, public works, development and parks operations.

Expenditures



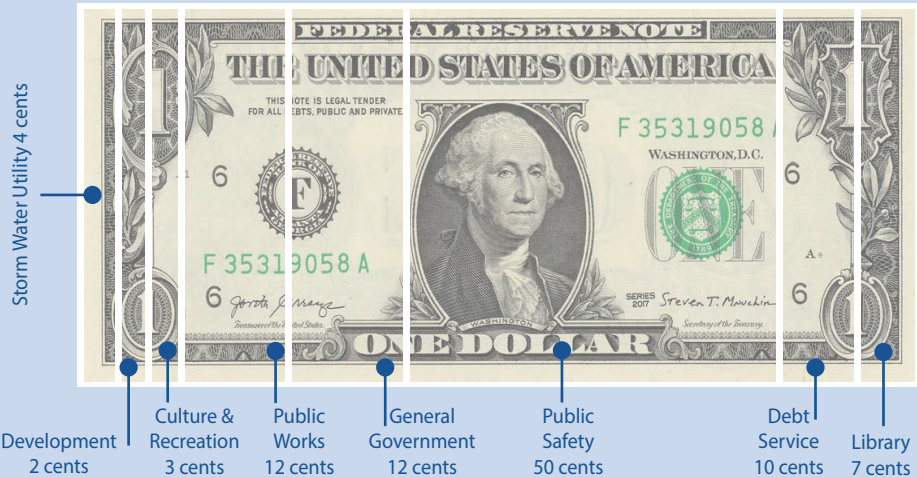
2023 Village Tax Levy

The Village Board adopted a mill rate of \$5.20 and a tax levy of \$25,046,000. Both the mill rate and the tax levy are unchanged from 2022.

For a typical Menomonee Falls home valued at \$350,000, the owner will pay \$1,820 in Village property taxes in 2023. At a monthly cost of under \$152 for Village services, a typical property owner receives a good value compared to other common household monthly costs.

The Greater Menomonee Falls Foundation (GMFF) is your hometown opportunity to spread your charitable giving across our community. Organized in 1991 by visionary leaders to provide a long-term financial resource for meeting community needs, the Foundation is governed by a volunteer board of civic-minded citizens. As a tax-exempt public trust, the GMFF offers donors an easy and cost-effective way to invest in the community through current donations or their estates. Earnings from its endowment fund are distributed annually through a grant program supporting safety, health, education, cultural and environmental non-profit groups that work to keep the Village strong and vibrant.

Since its inception, more than fifty local non-profit groups have benefited from the annual grant program. Over the past ten years, \$200,000 in grants have been disbursed. The roster of grants awarded in 2022 includes: Accompany of Kids, Association for the Rights of Citizens with Handicaps (ARCh), GPS Education Partners, Variety Children's Charity of Wisconsin, Community League Civic Families Committee, HOPE Network for Single Mothers, The Women's Center Emergency Shelter, Menomonee Falls Farmers Market, and the Menomonee Falls Historical Society. From microphones to adaptive bicycles, and domestic violence survivors to the restoration of a historic site, the grants make a difference for these organizations and the community services they provide.

From its beginning, the Foundation has partnered with the community. Early on it served as a repository for funds raised for Village Christmas decorations and holiday parades. Its most recent venture was the revival and enhancement of the popular Farmers Market. When its original sponsors backed away, the GMFF stepped up— managed the market and oversaw its transition to a self-supporting entity with an independent board of directors. Everyone benefits from the fresh, local foods and services, including the Falls Food Pantry that receives the leftover produce.

Annually the Foundation hosts Ovation, a recognition event that applauds community leaders who have volunteered countless hours for the betterment of the community. This year's event recognized Jerry Mislant (Lifetime Achievement), Jill Schmidt (Shining Star), Cecelia Valentine (Unsung Hero), and Wally Kangas (Patriotism). 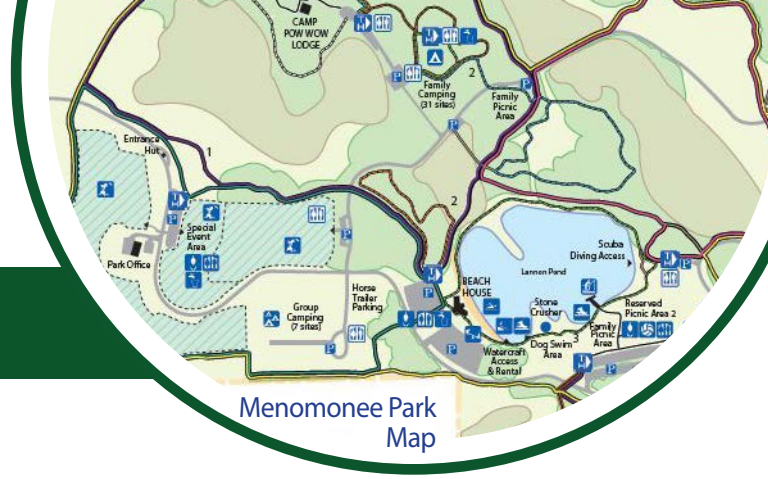

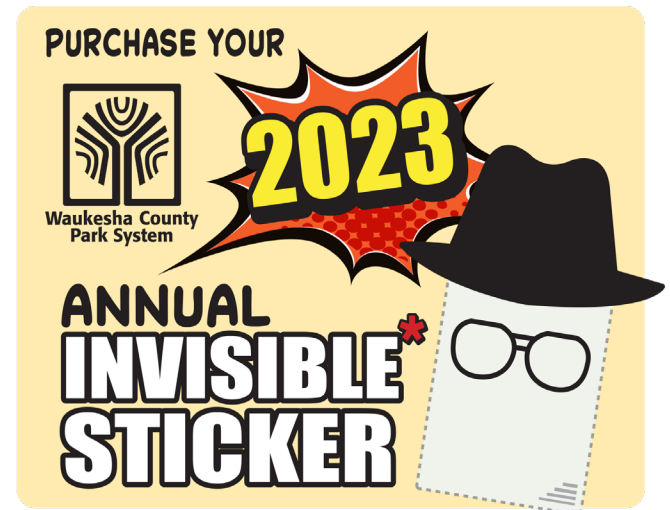

Mental Health - Looking Out for Each Other During the Holiday Season & Beyond

The holiday season is meant to be a time to enjoy being with family, friends and to celebrate. Unfortunately, this is also a time where there can be increased stress or anxiety for a multitude of reasons. Employment instability, financial troubles, relationship issues, military deployments, serious medical diagnosis or drug or alcohol abuse can all add to the holiday stress. In addition, diagnosed and undiagnosed mental health conditions can compound existing issues and may be even more difficult to address and treat.

It is important to remember that we are not always aware of the struggles other people may be going through, particularly with regard to mental health issues. Part of the reason we misunderstand others challenges is the stigma associated with mental health conditions. These conditions are often dismissed as a temporary issue that someone should be able to “get over”, and that is truly not the case. Mental health conditions also impact everyone close to the affected person who walk the difficult path of searching for a proper diagnosis and treatment plan. While we are not experts in mental health here at the Police Department, we deal with this issue on a day to day basis and have access to many resources.

The Menomonee Falls Police Department is called daily to assist when people are in crisis. Due to the prevalence of mental health related calls, the department decided several years ago to send all officers to **crisis intervention training (CIT)**. This forty-hour training is sponsored by the National Alliance on Mental Health (NAMI). CIT is a comprehensive five-day training session designed to assist law enforcement officers and other first responders in recognizing and understanding the signs and symptoms of mental health conditions including depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia and anxiety disorders, as well as other associated illnesses like developmental & cognitive disorders.

Officers who complete crisis intervention training learn:

- Various options to facilitate de-escalation of the mental health consumer in crisis.
- Resources in the community that are available to the individual and their families.
- Learn how interacting on a regular basis in this kind of outreach program reduces the potential for crisis and/or injury of the officer, consumer or others.

The skills taught in this course will be used by the officers throughout their life both personally and professionally. We want people to know that we care and understand that it takes a collective effort to try to seek help and provide access to resources for those in crisis. Remember we may not always know the struggles other face, so be kind. From our family to yours, we wish everyone a warm holiday season and a happy New Year.

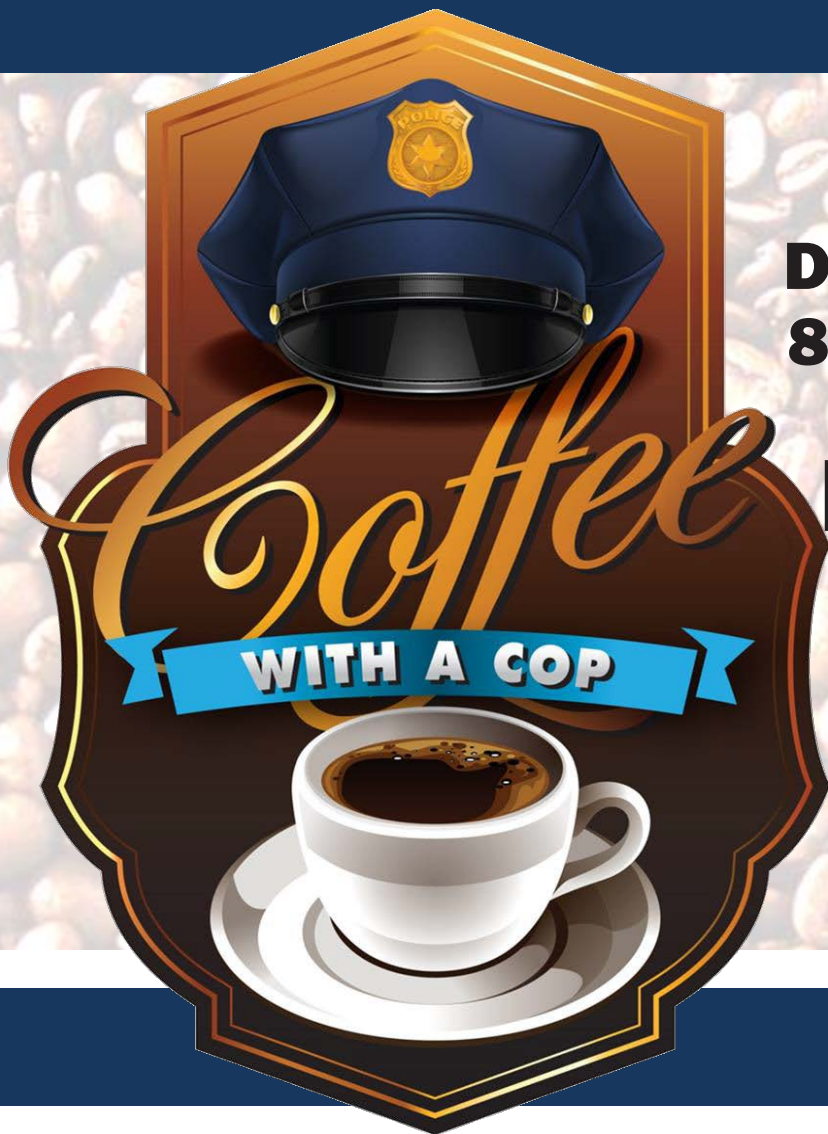

Menomonee Falls Remembers

Victor Herbert Perrin
(1916 - 1989)



The Menomonee Falls Historical Society is pleased to showcase one of our own who was born in Menomonee Falls and went on to Hollywood to become a movie star beginning in 1940.

A Menomonee Falls Resident Goes to Hollywood

Victor Perrin was born in Menomonee Falls in 1916 to Kathryn (née Mittlesteadt) and Milton A. Perrin, who was a traveling salesman. Victor graduated from Menomonee Falls High School in 1933. In 1940, Victor moved to California after graduating from the University of Wisconsin–Madison in the late 1930s.

Victor, a film, television, and radio actor, was best known for his radio voice over as the "Control Voice" in the original version of the television series *The Outer Limits* (1963–1965). His list of credits is impressively long and includes roles as a narrator in feature films at Walt Disney World Resort. He was the original voice narrator for Disney's Epcot Center attraction: *Spaceship Earth*.

His career spanned forty-six years. His earlier television appearances and voice over work included *The Twilight Zone*, *Dragnet*, 1966, *Star Trek*, *Wonder Woman*, *Adam-12*, *Buck Rogers*, *Have Gun-Will Travel*, and *The Outer Limits*, *Julius Caesar*,

Gunsmoke, the narrator on *Spartacus*, *Gargoyles*, and *The Hindenburg* just to name a few.

Personal Life

He was married to Evelyn Held in 1963. Evelyn passed away in 1972 and they did not have any children.

He then married Rita Singer in 1977 and had a son, George. He also had a stepson, Steven, from Rita's previous marriage. Perrin and Rita divorced in January 1979, however remarried again in September of the same year. Perrin died of cancer on July 4, 1989 in Los Angeles, California at the age of 73.

Carbon Monoxide Safety

It is a good time of the year to check the “other detector” that you should have in your home : a carbon monoxide detector. Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas that can kill by binding with hemoglobin in your blood, preventing it from carrying oxygen to your cells.

CO results from the burning of fossil fuels, including but not limited to: oil furnaces, gas stoves and wood burning fire places. Electric powered appliances like an electric stove, microwave oven , toaster and electric lights do not create CO with their use.

While many detectors are found near the floor, that is due to the need to plug those models into an outlet. CO is slightly less dense than air and will rise. Ideal height of a detector is at eye level to avoid damage and be able to view a display if the model has one.

Typical life span of a CO detector is around seven years. Detectors at the end of their life span will have an intermittent chirp. Reaching the alarm threshold produces an alarm that is continuous. A rapid rise to a high level of a long exposure to an elevated level will cause an alarm. That is why some models are incorporating displays to show the level . Read and save the directions that come with the detector.

If you have an alarm activation, exit the structure and then call 911. Our equipment will help eliminate or pinpoint sources of CO. WE Energies may be called also to assist. More information can be found at

Learn CPR Save a Life

For every minute a person goes without the circulation of oxygenated blood in their body, their chance of survival from cardiac arrest decreases by 10 percent. To enhance safety in the Village, the Menomonee Falls Fire Department is offering CPR certification classes for free. Training in the operation of **Automatic External Defibrillators**, or AEDs is part of the course. AEDs are found in schools, churches, stores and many public places.



Classes will be held at MFFD Station 3 on the following Mondays: December 19th, January 23rd and February 20th. Classes start at 6 pm and last 3 hours.

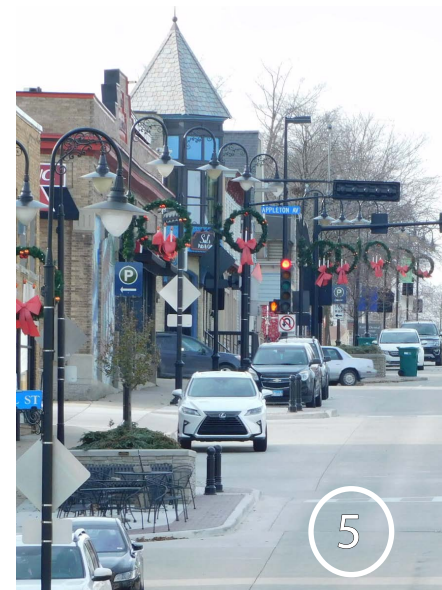
