A Time to Reflect & Look Ahead

As the end of the calendar year approaches, it is a good time to reflect on some noteworthy Village happenings from 2023 and to look ahead to what we can expect in 2024.

Menomonee Falls strengthened its reputation as a regional destination this year with a full slate of successful community events and the opening of the Village Park splash pad and accessible play area. The growing Farmers Market and the summer concert series contributed to an estimated 225,000+ people visiting Village Park in 2023! We welcomed a new hotel on Falls Parkway and a new restaurant in the heart of downtown, and we approved building permits for a major mixed-use development at the corner of Good Hope and Appleton Avenue.

The Village also took important steps in 2023 to ensure effective and sustainable public services for our community. We committed to the hiring of 14 full-time firefighters, coordinated a community-wide property revaluation, completed a water main replacement on Pilgrim Road, and approved a storm water utility fee to comply with state laws and maintain our growing storm water infrastructure.

2024 is expected to be another busy year in Menomonee Falls for development, public projects, and community events. The Village has a growing inventory of residential lots, approvals in place for major commercial projects, and plans to update the look and layout of Centennial Plaza. We will also be rolling out the storm water utility fee, conducting the 2024 elections, and welcoming hundreds of new residents to the Village. With our continued steady growth, Menomonee Falls' population is likely to exceed 40,000 in the next couple of years.

As we head into 2024, this edition of *The Current* newsletter provides timely information about Village winter operations, an overview of the storm water utility fee, updates on development projects, and seasonal safety reminders from the Police Department and Fire Department. It also highlights community partner organizations, winter events, and volunteer opportunities to consider during the coldest time of the year. Thank you for taking some time to learn about what is happening in Menomonee Falls. Stay safe, and stay warm!

Winter Operations in Menomonee Falls

When does Public Works come out to plow?

We have over 30 Public Works and Utilities operators that work long hours throughout the winter to ensure that our streets are plowed and treated as efficiently as possible.

Snow and ice operations begin when any of the following conditions are met:

- Snow accumulation of 2" or more is expected
- Drifting snow is causing hazardous travel conditions
- Icy conditions are adversely affecting travel
- Time of snowfall is affecting peak travel times

What is the goal of snow and ice operations?

The immediate objective of snow and ice control operations is to maintain reasonably safe driving conditions during and following storm events. This does not, however, mean that bare pavement should be expected by motorists, nor does this mean that all streets will be free of snow and ice. Motorists and pedestrians are expected to take necessary precautions and to observe safe winter driving habits. Keep in mind that our snow and ice operations focus on the heavily-traveled roadways in Menomonee Falls, such as Main Street, Appleton Avenue, and Menomonee Avenue. All subdivisions will be plowed, but will only be salted on hills, curves, and intersections due to lower speed limits and less travel on these streets.

Will winter weather affect waste and recycling collection?

Please be aware that freezing temperatures may delay waste and recycling pickup services from Waste Management. Severe temperatures can cause equipment issues which can lead to delays. Please note that waste and recycling receptacles should be placed at least three (3) feet away from each other and other objects. During the winter, please use your driveway or clear an area along the side of your driveway to place your carts.

Do I have to clear the sidewalk in front of my house?

It is the owner's responsibility to clear the concrete sidewalk in front of the property and treat with salt or sand if ice has formed. The Village clears sidewalks in front of Village property, as well as some parts of the downtown area. Asphalt trails are not considered sidewalks, so snow clearance is not required.

What else do I need to know about Winter Operations?

- Snow should not be shoveled or blown into the street
- Do not pull up behind snow plows when they are equipped and engaged for snow removal.
- Snow plows may cause damage to turf adjacent to streets and sidewalks. Turf that has been damaged and reported will be repaired in the spring. The Village will not be responsible for damage as a result of the use of sand or de-icing chemicals or for damage to landscaping, sprinkler systems, or any other private items located in the public right-of-way.
- The Village encourages residents to clear the snow from any fire hydrants near your house.
- Residents are asked to check the condition of their mailbox and post – in most cases, a strong post and secure mailbox will withstand the impact of snow coming off of the snowplow.

2024 Dog Licenses

2023 dog licenses expire December 31st, 2023. To license your dog for 2024, submit a completed [application for dog license](#) and a \$10 fee per dog (\$15 for unneutered/unspayed dogs) to the Clerk Services Department. After March 31st, fees increase to \$15 for neutered/spayed dogs and \$20 for unneutered/unspayed dogs.

Storm Water Utility Fee Explained

STORM WATER FAQS

In recent years, storm water management has placed a growing financial burden on communities across the region. To pay for increasing costs, many municipalities in Wisconsin have implemented user fees for storm water management services. These new charges are called storm water fees or **storm water utility fees** because they are modeled after the way municipalities have historically billed residents for other utility services like water and sewer. Storm water fees provide local governments with a stable source of revenue to pay for their growing storm water management costs.

Developed land generates tremendous amounts of storm water that causes property damage and water pollution if it's not managed properly. On an acre-per-acre basis, developed areas generate more storm water runoff than rural areas because they contain more hard structures like rooftops, driveways, parking lots, sidewalks and roads. These hard surfaces are called impervious, because they prevent precipitation from soaking into the ground.

Why does storm water management cost money?

To manage excess storm water that's generated, Menomonee Falls has built a storm water management system consisting of ditches, catch basins, inlets, underground pipes, and other interconnected structures designed to move storm water out of inhabited areas. The storm water systems most of us take for granted are getting more expensive to design, construct, and maintain. Other infrastructure needs to be expanded to handle increased storm water loads from development and more frequently occurring large rainstorms.

An increasing number of suburban municipalities are now required to obtain storm water discharge permits from the DNR to comply with state and federal laws. These "permitted communities" must develop storm water management

programs and implement best management practices, including public education, to reduce pollution levels in the storm water they discharge into local waterways. Meeting these discharge permit requirements adds significant cost.

Municipalities require additional revenue from stable sources which basically leaves two options: raising taxes or implementing fees. New fees are the preference because compared to new tax dollars, fee revenue is easier to:

1. Apply to all properties that generate storm water runoff, and
2. Calculate in a fair and equitable manner.

Storm water fees are considered enterprise or dedicated funds. This means the money from the fees can only go toward storm water management related activities. Tax money on the other hand, is subject to competition from other municipal programs. Fee programs apply to everyone who uses the billed service.

So, under a user fee program, all storm water producing properties, even those owned by tax exempt organizations like public schools, universities, churches, and other nonprofits, must still pay the fee. Finally, storm water rates are easier to calculate fairly using a fee structure instead of relying on tax criteria like assessed property values, which don't correlate well to the actual amount of storm water a property generates.

Storm Water Utility Fee Continued...

How are storm water fees calculated?

Storm water fees in Wisconsin are based on the amount of impervious cover a property contains. Roofs, driveways, patios, and parking lots all usually count towards the total, but public sidewalks and roadways are not factored in. Properties with more impervious cover generate more storm water runoff which puts a greater demand on the municipal storm water system, compared to properties with less impervious cover. Because properties with lots of impervious surface require more storm water service, they pay larger storm water fees.

Municipalities use different approaches to estimate the impervious cover on each of the residential, commercial and institutional properties. In some instances, property measurements are taken in the field but, more often, they use aerial imagery and computer software to calculate coverages from the office. Municipalities often calculate a representative value to project the runoff from their residential properties. This is done by carefully measuring the impervious cover from a sample of typical single-family residential parcels to determine a median area measured in square feet. This value is called an ERU, short for **Equivalent Residential Unit**.



The ERU represents a base billing unit. Properties with lots of impervious cover may be charged multiple ERUs, and all single family properties will be counted as one ERU.

A monthly storm water fee of \$5.74 per ERU (\$68.88 annually) was approved at the September 18, 2023 Village Board meeting for implementation starting the first quarter of 2024.

Christmas Tree Disposal


The deadline for all natural Christmas trees to be set out by the road is Sunday, January 14th. Trees will automatically be picked up as time permits – no appointments are necessary. Discarded natural Christmas trees must be clean of all decorations, lights, stands, tinsel, garland, wire, plastic bags, etc. Discarded Christmas wreaths must be disposed of in the garbage along with regular trash.

Public Projects

Capital projects which improved public spaces, streets, and infrastructure in 2023 included the Pilgrim Road water main replacement, development of Aero Park, the Roman Drive and Ridgeview Drive street reconstructions, and several utility projects.



Aero Park Phase I

This project included grading and site preparation, prairie / wetland restoration, tree planting, and the installation of an asphalt trail loop with a wooden boardwalk section. The trail loop is now open to the public but parking access is currently limited to streets in the adjacent Tamarind and Aero Park subdivisions. Future phases will include a parking area, playground, restrooms, picnic shelters, and sport courts. These improvements are anticipated to be constructed over the next five years.

Overview of 2023 Infrastructure Projects

- Pilgrim Road water main reconstruction
- 1.7 miles of new streets in five residential subdivisions
- 0.4 miles of reconstructed streets and 2.5 miles of asphalt repaving
- 5.3 miles of water main and 3.5 miles of sanitary sewer
- 1.8 miles of new asphalt trails at Aero Park and near new residential subdivisions

Aero Park is being developed to provide a community park and green space in southwest Menomonee Falls. This project will provide outdoor recreational opportunities for thousands of new and long-time residents.

Private Sector Projects

Both the residential and commercial development sectors remained strong in Menomonee Falls in 2023 with dozens of major projects adding homes, value, and new jobs to the Village.



2023 Year in Review



Menomonee Falls remained among the regional leaders for home construction in 2023. Through October, the Village had issued permits for 13 percent of the new housing units constructed in the Milwaukee Metropolitan Area.

- **5 new buildings** are under construction in the Falls Mixed-Use project along Good Hope Road
- Projects by Wisconsin Shower Door, Luther Group, Guidepost Montessori, and Falls Mixed Use will add dozens of jobs to the Village
- **70 single family homes** 14 duplex units, and 173 market rate apartment units have been approved through November of 2022
- **New construction value will exceed \$100 million** for the 10th consecutive year



2024 General Operating Budget Overview

Key Budget Details


- Mill rate decreased to \$3.80 per \$1,000 assessed value
- 20.2% General Operating Budget increase (SAFER grant revenue & expenditures included)
- Village tax levy increase 8.3%
- Health insurance decrease of 14%, savings of \$200k
- Garbage & Recycling fee increase of \$4.92
- No change in Sewer and Water rate in 2024



Summary

The 2024 General Operating Budget was adopted on November 20th, 2023 with total revenues and expenditures of \$37,868,600, which is a 20.2% increase from 2023. The budget reflects the Village's mission to provide the highest quality municipal services consistent with the changing needs and desires of the community and a realistic assessment of resources

available. The primary source of financing for the General Operating Budget (59.5%) comes from property taxes. Village spending for operations includes general government, police, fire, public works, development and parks operations.




2024 Village Tax Levy

The Village Board adopted a mill rate of \$3.80 and a tax levy of \$27,113,000. The mill rate decreased following the 2023 revaluation, and the levy increased by 8.2 percent. For a typical Menomonee Falls home valued at \$400,000, the owner will pay \$1,520 in Village property taxes in 2024. At a monthly cost of under \$127 for Village services, a typical property owner receives a good value compared to other common household monthly costs.





Falls Area FOOD PANTRY

Celebrates 40 Years of Service



The Village of Menomonee Falls is, by most accounts, a very special place for a wide variety of reasons. However, one of the very best reasons is the extraordinary generosity of its residents and neighbors. This is best demonstrated by the formation of the Falls Area Food Pantry which is celebrating 40 years of service to the residents of eight communities. The Pantry serves residents from Brookfield, Butler, Colgate, Hubertus, Germantown, Lannon, Menomonee Falls, and Richfield.

The Pantry began its formation in February of 1983 when the Falls Area Christian Taskforce (F.A.C.T.) met to discuss ways to serve families in need in their communities. One short month later, the Falls Area Food Pantry was opened on March 3rd, and it operated from its first site located at Lincoln School until late 1985. Subsequent homes included: Thomas Jefferson School (1985-1990); Valley View School (1990 -1995); St. Anthony Catholic Church (1995-1996) and Hiawatha School (1996-2011).

In 2011, the Pantry needed another new home. The Village of Menomonee Falls stepped in and allowed the Pantry to move into the former Sewage Treatment Plant Building on Menomonee River Parkway. During this time, the Pantry was incorporated under the name Falls Area Community Services and raised enough donations to build a warehouse onto the original building where it continues to operate today.

Throughout its first 40 years of service, the Pantry has been operated solely by volunteers. The founding congregations that provided both volunteer and



financial support are: Emmanuel Community United Methodist Church, Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, Good Shepard Catholic Church, Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church, Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Lutheran Church of the Living Christ, Lutheran Church of the Prince of Peace, St. Anthony Catholic Church, St. Francis Episcopal Church, St. John United Church of Christ, St. Mary Catholic Church, St. Paul's United Church of Christ, Shepard of the Hills Lutheran Church. Four more congregations joined in supporting these founders. They are: Falls Presbyterian Church, St. Boniface Catholic Church, Legacy Christian Church and Bethlehem Lutheran Church.

Clients are able to visit the Pantry twice per month. If anyone is in any need of food or help, please contact the pantry at 262-251-6848 or email info@fallsfoodpantry.org. The Pantry currently operates on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 12 - 2 pm and 5 - 7 pm. In early 2024, the Pantry will resume in-person shopping on Thursdays with Tuesdays remaining as its drive through option. Menomonee Falls Fire Department Winter Safety Reminders

Carbon Monoxide Safety

Now that it is officially cold outside, the Menomonee Falls Fire Department wants to remind residents of the importance of carbon monoxide and smoke detectors.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is referred to as the silent killer. It is an odorless and tasteless byproduct of the combustion of fossil fuels. Electric appliances do not emit CO. Low concentrations over an extended period of time are as dangerous as higher concentrations. The life span of a CO detector is different than a smoke detector, making planned replacement vary by manufacturer. For this reason, it is important to read the instructions and save them for future reference.

Increased use of heating and cooking appliances along with more time inside with doors and windows closed can lead to CO levels approaching dangerous levels. In the event of a power outage, generator use is more common in the winter months to stay warm. An improperly vented generator can lead to a rapid buildup of CO.

Keep The Wreath Green

Menomonee Falls Fire Department places a wreath in front of its stations and illuminates it with green bulbs in a fire safety campaign called Keep The Wreath Green. The goal is to promote fire safety awareness. Every time there is a fire incident in Menomonee Falls one of the wreath bulbs will be changed to red. In 2022 Menomonee Falls was able to keep all the bulbs green! Lets keep this winning streak going. The following tips can help us achieve this goal.

Tree Safety

Keeping a tree fresh and watered could make the difference between losing your house or your life. When displaying your tree, make sure the tree is away from fireplaces and portable heaters. Check the water level daily, and add water as needed. A six foot tree will absorb one gallon of water every two days. Because a heater vent nearby will dry out natural trees , keep those tree stands filled with water, checking them every day.

Lights and Candles

Never use real candles on a natural or artificial tree or near other greenery. Use only lights tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters' Laboratories (UL). All lights, new or old, should be inspected for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Turn off all lights prior to going to bed or leaving the house. The lights could short out and start a fire. Decorated light villages, nativity scenes, or electrical scenery should be treated as decorative lights.

Fireplace Safety

Have your chimney and fireplace inspected by a professional to make sure it's clean and free of obstructions. Be sure the fireplace is covered with a metal screen or glass doors to prevent the spread of sparks and fire. Do not burn wrapping paper in the fireplace because of the paper being highly flammable. Dangerous sparks and flying embers are possible. Gather all the gift boxes and discard them with the garbage and recyclable materials. Wait until ash is completely cold before disposing of properly.

By the Numbers - 2023

As of November 2nd, 2023 the MFFD has responded to 4,873 calls for service this year.

Menomonee Falls Fire Department operates [Fleet 428](#), a water tank truck referred to as a tender. The tank is mounted on a Peterbilt Model 357 chassis with a capacity of 66,000 pounds. Fleet 428 has a 12 liter displacement, 6 cylinder Caterpillar C-12 diesel engine in it, which produces 425 horsepower. The tank can hold 3,500 gallons of water, which weighs over 29,000 pounds!

Menomonee Falls Police and Fire Departments Join Forces for the Safety of the Community



The Menomonee Falls Police and Fire Departments share a collective interest in effective and current training practices. Each department concentrates on skill-based training to effectively handle a multitude of situations. Training is crucial particularly when it comes to critical incidents where time is not on our side. Although these incidents occur with less frequency, they have a higher risk of threat to the public. This past fall, our officers, firefighters and emergency medical technicians participated in joint training called **rescue task force**.

Rescue task force training was created to provide an integrated response with police and fire departments to address a mass casualty incident as a result of an active assailant. The purpose is to provide immediate and life-saving care while ensuring protection of the first responders providing that care. Often times these incidents can be very chaotic for all involved. The guiding principles for our first responders are to stop the threat while treating the injured and saving lives. It provides a framework to bring an organized pre-planned response to minimize the chaos.

This year's training took place at a large vacant office building provided by one of our community partners. This was a real and unknown environment to provide a realistic experience to the first responders. The training was over an 8-hour day and built upon concepts starting with a classroom portion and ending in scenario-based, hands-on training. The training was led by a team of experienced fire and police department trainers.



The planning took several months and every aspect was reviewed and examined to provide an immersive experience. This also included volunteer participants as injured patients requiring care. Police and fire members were shoulder to shoulder and truly worked as a team. There were four training dates and most police and fire members were in attendance.

The rescue task force training ultimately provided a solid foundation of trained first responders who are prepared for the unexpected in the Village and any community that may require us to respond in similar fashion. A sincere thank you to those trainers that put in a lot of time and effort into the planning and organizing of this rescue task force days.
